<u>Coamhain</u>

The summer solstice, around 21 June, or Coamhain is seen as the biggest of the Celtic festivals.



Summer - South - Fire: The south is the place of summer in the cycle of a year, the time of heat and high activity when the sun is at Coamhain honours the power of the sun, for the sun is at its strongest at this time. The celebrations would start at dusk the night before and go on through the night until dawn. At dawn everyone would face the East and welcome the sun on its longest and most powerful day. It was also a time when wands and magical staffs were cut from the trees in the forest, for it was thought that they held the greatest power of the light at this time.

its most powerful. When the sun is strong, everything in nature is expressive. Even humans feel more energized when the sun shines. The power of the South is the power of Fire. Clan Bell of North America

President David Erwin Bell met with The Lord Lyon to discuss future options for worldwide Clan Bell as regards its future leadership. There has been no approved chief or leader of Clan Bell (aka The Clan of the Bells) since 1627/8—the date of death of Chief William Bell of Blacket House. Though there are Bells of Blacket House who hold arms even now and eligible non-arms bearing descendants of varying ages who might be chief should they apply to the Court of the Lord Lyon, none has applied. The Lord Lyon informed David that the Bell Clan Chief Petition file had been open for some time. Not one of the eligible Bell descendants of Blacket House has filed to be recognized as chief. The Lord Lyon recommended that David should prepare a letter to the Lord Lyon, asking the Lord Lyon to schedule a family/clan council in Inverness, Scotland, to elect a Commander of Clan Bell. When gueried about living Blacket House Bells who may be eligible to be chief, the Lord Lyon indicated that the calling of this meeting (a derbhfine) may well encourage legitimate candidates for the chief position to step forward. Either way, the Clan of the Bells will have a Lord Lyon recognized leader in the near future.

GAELIC FLOURISHES IN TORONTO

FORTY-TWO eager students attended the biannual CANAN AGUS ORAN (Language and Songs) workshop at the University of Toronto on Saturday, May 5th. Designed by Lorrie MacKinnon, under the umbrella of the Gaelic Society of Toronto, this event has been instrumental in promoting Scottish Gaelic for many years. The attendees were divided into Beginners 1 under the tutelage of Bostonian Nathanial Harrington, a Graduate of Sabhal Mòr Ostaig, the Gaelic University on the Isle of Skye and presently a Ph.D. student at the University of Toronto. Beginners 2 spent the day with Oighrig MacNeil Keogh, a native Gaelic speaker from Benbecula. The more proficient students categorized as Intermediate Level, were in the efficient hands of Lorrie MacKinnnon, a fluent Gaelic speaker from Cape Breton living in Toronto and the Advanced Level, in which no English is allowed, was in the capable and delightful hands of Marie Britton who flew in from Nova Scotia.

Marie is a native of Edinburgh and completed a degree in Gaelic at Edinburgh University. Presently, she is a Professor of Gaelic at St. Frances Xavier University in Antigonish, Cape Breton. Not only is she a linguist but she is also a recording artist who sings a diverse collection of Gaelic songs from Puirt à Beul (Mouth Music which replicates pipe music) to laments and love songs. Her first album will be released shortly. She also plays the Clàrsaich (small Celtic harp) and performs and teaches Step Dancing.

AFTERNOON TEA

This highly social event is new this year and focuses in socializing over delicious sandwiches and pastries while being given an opportunity to chat with native Gaelic speakers and thus add to one's list of everyday phrases. A young piper of Lewis and Greek background, Cameron Festopolous, will entertain as will Sarah West, a



gifted visual artist who also shares stories from her formidable research in Celtic Mythology. Gaelic songs will be sung with invitations to all present to join in the choruses.

The venue is The Estonian Centre on Broadview, the date being 26 May 2018. It will be in the "past tense" by the time you read it here!

We also have Kevin James doing a talk on:

"A Mobile People as Migrants to Canada: Dynamics of Scottish Migration" In this talk, Kevin James explores Scots' centuries-old willingness to uproot themselves for commercial advantage, as both temporary migrants and settlers, in a variety of capacities, around the world. He focuses on Canada and various waves of migration characterised by different source locations in Scotland, areas of settlement in Canada, and migration and settlement structures.

Kevin James is Professor of History at the University of Guelph, Ontario, Canada. He is author of two monographs, most recently Tourism, Land, and Landscape in Ireland: The Commodification of Culture (London: Routledge, 2014). He has also published widely in journals and edited collections on the labour history of the Irish and Scottish textile trades and the development of the tourism sector in the nineteenth-century United Kingdom, and on social, economic and cultural interactions between Scotland and Ireland. The recipient of numerous major national and international grants, deputy editor of the Journal of Tourism History, and founder of the Tourism History Working Group, his current research programme explores the history of the hotel as a social, cultural, and commercial institution in Britain and Ireland from 1832-1922.

GUIDE FOR CLAN TENT HOSTS

With thanks to Barb Duff (Clans MacFarlane and MacRae) for allowing us to publish this guide.

- 1. Go on the internet to Highland Games/Festival site that you wish to attend.
- 2. Fill out required information, i.e. introduction letter, registration, etc.

3. Make payment or request Clan Treasurer to pay the fee for the tent space (if Clan allows, or pay yourself). You will need to send the Application to the Treasurer. Tent space is often 10'x10'.

4. Games/Festival may send you gate tickets by e-mail or by regular mail, as well as a parking pass. You may have to pick them up from the Registration Tent at the Games.

SETTING UP A TENT

1. A. If a tent is rented from the games, they will set it up.

B. If you have a tent, you can set it up the night before the games or the morning of the games. (Check with the game site.)

2. A. You may be able to rent tables and chairs from the games. (Need to be reserved or requested when registering) Some Games provide these with the tent.

B. You can bring your own tables and chairs. We like having tables to the back and/or the sides of the tent creating a feeling of openness for the visitors.

3. You will need table cloths, wide and long enough to hide your storage boxes.

A. It is nice to pick up some Celtic patterned ones from game vendors.

B. Or you can use any solid colored table cloth with a tartan material runner.

4. You will need to get a tent Banner or sign from your Clan or purchase or make one yourself.

5. Flags to fly at your tent. i.e.: US, Canadian, Scottish, Saltire, State, Province, Nations represented by

Clan. Flags can be attached to the tent legs or in a flag stand.

6. Banner to carry for a parade of Clans.

7. Optional Mannequin(s) with Scottish attire (if desired or selling Clan T-shirts for display purposes).

8. Find out what other clans are present so you can direct someone to their own clan tent.

TABLE DISPLAY MATERIALS

1. A stand-up sign on your table with your group name.

2. Books about Scotland, and about your Clan, any books that list what tartan belongs to what name and

books that show what the tartan(s) look like - "Tartan for Me" -is a good reference book to have, Kith & Kin, Black's Surnames of Scotland, etc. "Tartans" is a three-volume set of Clan and Regional and District tartan illustrations. Anyone who visits wants to know what their tartan is and what it looks like

3. Scottish maps, Clans of Scotland poster, Clan Sept poster

4. Scottish and Clan paraphernalia: Coo's, Clan Newsletters, clothing, tartan samples, maps, photos, Clan crest plaque, etc., anything unique to your Clan.

5. Pictures of: Scotland, famous Clan Members or the Chief and family, ancestral sites.

6. Host needs to print or create forms for the Clan:

Sign-in Visitor Sheets,

Clan brochures with contact information (in a holder is good),

Business cards with contact info (in front of the brochures in the holder is good) Clan membership applications,

Genealogy applications (if applicable, and Genealogy is what draws members),

Clan DNA Project hand-outs (if applicable),

CASSOC Binder to help support each other.

7. Pens; blank paper in/on a clip board; Clan stamp (can get from your Clan or have made up at Staples or Business Depot), ink pad for the stamp unless self-inking; tape: cello, masking, and duct; scissors or box cutter (or a sharp skean dubh);

8. Tarps or clear plastic painting drop sheets to cover tables in case of rain or at night.

9. Name badge for hosts. (from Clan or make your own - should be worn)

10. After the game send Clan the membership forms, money, and visitor sign-in sheets to the relevant recipient. Someone in your Clan should reach out to everyone who visited to welcome them (via email) and to answer any questions.

EXTRAS

1. Bottles of water to hand out to visitors.

2. Candy (mints, Scottish Toffee, jelly beans or 'gummy bears' in your clan tartan colours), Whiskey/Heather Cream (if allowed), small tasting cups.

3. Bungee cords, clamps (from hardware store), table cloth holders/clamps from camping or hardware store

4. Extra chairs, maybe an extra table
